#### Notes from the Principal, Jody Steinke...

First Semester flew by as did Winter Break. We are now staring down Spring Break. It will be a sprint to the end of the year and all that entails: Prom, Senior Awards Night, and Graduation. Below is some important information as we close the book on First Semester and prepare for the end of this school year.

- Five Essentials Each year, schools across the State of Illinois administer the Five Essentials
   Survey to students and staff. They also ask parents to complete the survey. It provides valuable
   feedback to us to continue our school improvement journey. Please consider taking the survey
   at qps.org.
- **Scholarships** There are a number of local scholarship opportunities available to our graduating juniors and seniors. Scholarship information will be available soon in the Counseling Office.
- 2023-24 Registration Counselors have been working hard to get students registered for next school year. If you have questions or concerns about this process, please reach out to your child's counselor.
- Vaping We have a problem at QHS. Far too many students are bringing vapes and related devices into school. Some contain nicotine and some contain THC. Either way, school is not a place for these devices. Some students have lost an enormous amount of instructional time because of this. In addition, thousands of dollars in tickets have been written. We are going to redouble our efforts in this area as we push toward the last third of the school year. We also need your help. Please talk to your child about the many dangers and risks, including loss of school time and potential expulsion, that these activities represent. We also are lucky to now have a substance abuse counselor on site at QHS to help students with these issues. If you feel that your child needs this service and would be willing to meet with our substance abuse counselor, please contact your child's counselor or dean.
- Parent Teacher Conference Day February 17<sup>th</sup> will be a half day of school and a half day for Parent Teacher Conferences. Conferences will run from 12:00 to 2:45. No appointment is needed, and teachers will be in their classrooms.
- **Senior Awards Night** Senior Awards Night will be at 6:30 PM on Monday, May 22<sup>nd</sup> in the QHS Theatre.
- Senior Event For over 70 years, parents of QHS seniors have planned a senior event. For many years, this was the All Night Party. Recently, it has been the Senior Picnic. This year, the parents have decided to a Senior Party at Flinn Stadium on Sunday, May 21<sup>st</sup> from 7:00 to 11:00. A lot of help will be needed to plan and organize. #### Notes from the Athletic Director, Matt McClelland...

What a great winter season it has been! All our winter sports have been having great seasons and are not finished yet! We started postseason events for both Pom and Wrestling this past weekend and will start Basketball Regionals action next week.

Some short highlights from each winter sport:

**Boys Basketball:** With our current record sitting at 20-4, 9-2 in the WB6 heading into the Rock Island game on Tuesday, our boys team is playing really well. No doubt the last few games of our regular season will challenge us and set us up for what we hope is another deep postseason run.

**Cheer:** Both our JV and Varsity Cheerleaders have kept our crowds going at our games this winter. QHS vs. QND is always one of our highlight games for the cheerleaders. They also had a chance to host their annual Lil Devils Cheer Camp on Sunday, February 5. They will perform at halftime of the JV game on Friday, February 10.

**Girls Basketball:** The girls' current record stands at 17-11, 8-5 in the WB6. We are having one our best seasons in recent years. The girls have been in the upper half of the conference standings all season and are currently sitting 3<sup>rd</sup>. We will start Regional play next Tuesday at Alton against Collinsville.

**Pom Pon:** The Q-City Pommers have put on great performances all winter long. The traditional "Light Show" is always a can't miss night before Christmas. We just competed at the IDTA Highland High School Regional Contest and finished fourth with 78.4 points, narrowly missing qualifying for state by 1.6 points.

**Wrestling:** Our wrestlers have picked up right where they left off last season. We won our Quincy Wrestling Tournament for the second year in a row and have not slowed down since. We placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in the WB6 Tournament, with 6 wrestlers earning All-Conference honors. We placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in the Alton Regional and are sending 11 wrestlers to the Sectional Championship in Normal.

# QHS SCHOOL WIDE TESTING

2nd Semester 2022-2023

**MAP Testing** will take place in our English I, English II, Algebra I, and Geometry classes. Winter MAP will occur during a week through January 3-February 3. Spring MAP testing will occur during a week through April 11-May 5. If a QHS student takes the MAP test this school year, scores will be sent home with the report cards following the end of second semester.

All Juniors will be taking the **Illinois Science Assessment**. This test will be administered at QHS on Wednesday, March 22<sup>nd</sup> for Juniors with the last name A-K and on Thursday, March 23<sup>rd</sup> for Juniors with the last name L-Z. This test will occur during the regular school day. More information to come.

QHS will be administering the **SAT/PSAT** on Wednesday, April 12<sup>th</sup>. Freshman will be taking the PSAT 8/9, Sophomores will be taking the PSAT 10, and Juniors will be taking the SAT. SAT/PSAT testing is a mandatory test for students in the State of Illinois. Any Seniors that did not sit for the mandatory test last year must take the test on April 12<sup>th</sup>. This will be required before any Senior can graduate. Students with accommodations may need to attend testing on multiple days. Students will be notified if this occurs. Seniors that have taken the SAT will have a College/Career Day (on their own). Seniors will not need to report to school on this day.

# **History Department Update**

# **World History**

World History will be transitioning from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance in the coming days. We will be studying the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles and their awe-inspiring works of art. We will also be discussing the works of Shakespeare and analyzing how much Thomas More's *Utopia* is actually a utopia. We will cap it all off with King Henry VIII's six wives and why he will not be winning any husband-of-the-year awards.

# **US History**

US History students are studying the Great Depression and the election (and re-elections) of FDR. World War II is looming on the horizon. We will study the American homefront and our involvement in the war, as well as the aftermath of the dropping of the atomic bombs in 1945.

AP US History students are learning about the Progressive Movement and World War I. This week they will play an online simulation as Canadian soldiers, hopefully surviving to the end. Unlike real soldiers, they can try again after that trench raid went poorly. A telegram home is generated after dying in action and a letter of commendation is sent once they finish the simulation. The record for telegrams last year was 7. Let us hope it goes better this time!


## **American Government**

Students recently took their quiz on Article I of the Constitution, the legislative branch, where they studied the important actions/duties of Congress and created Treasure Maps that detailed how a bill becomes a law. Many of the projects turned out great! Students also engaged in the complicated process of drawing legislative districts in Illinois during our lessons about gerrymandering.

As we begin studying Article II, the executive branch, students will be playing an online game where they will have to run a successful presidential campaign, as well as learn about the Electoral College. In a few weeks, students will also try their hand at creating campaign materials for an election of their choice including campaign posters, campaign buttons, and campaign ads.

# QHS Science Department News - Spring 2023

QHS Blue Devils have been working on improving their science skills this semester. The IL Science Standards include eight Science and Engineering Practices. Check out what we have been busy doing in class.



chemical reactions of burning Mg and barking H and Analyzing and Interpreting Data through logic puzzles to ID unknown substances.

Chemistry – Using mathematics and computational thinking for mole conversions.

Environmental Science – Asking questions and Defining Problems through STEM projects on alternative energy sources.

**Microbiology** – Practicing aseptic technique & **Obtaining Information** on the history of microbiology.

AP Biology – Carrying out Investigations of bacterial transformation (they made bacteria glow under UV light) and conducting gel electrophoresis of DNA fragments.

In the spring, the science department selects seniors who are leaders with consistent work ethic, citizenship qualities and a solid understanding of science content for four Senior Awards: general science, life science physical science and overall science student. Come to senior awards night to see who our award winners are for 2023.

# **ENGLISH DEPARTMENT UPDATE**

**English I** students just finished their study of the memoir *Night* by Elie Wiesel. They will spend the next three weeks studying other personal essays from the text *Girls Write Now* and *Humans of New York* before writing their own "Humans of QHS" essay.

**English II** students began the semester with a narrative essay writer's workshop. Students explored new writing techniques to showcase a story's imagery, enhance characterization, and develop strong themes. Students then studied the 1920s in preparation for *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald. The novel encourages critical thinking and exhibits strong literary devices while allowing contemporary student connections.





Theatre students are currently exploring the world of acting. Students began the semester with vocal work including diction, projection, and inflection. Stage blocking, body positions, and stage directions gave students a foundation to begin duet scene acting. The month of February will be focused on monologue and audition techniques while March will focus on children's theatre. Classes will perform a children's theatre production for area preschool and elementary students as a part of the unit. Our class productions have been a long-standing theatre class tradition for over 40 years!

**English III** students in English III read and performed Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* in October. Second semester in English III includes nonfiction work, SAT prep, and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.



All juniors will take the SAT on Wednesday, April 12.

**AP Language and AP Literature** students are working on their last few units before their AP tests in May. Students taking the AP test should take advantage of the following resources for free or low-cost test preparation:

- AP Classroom videos—These are aligned with unit skills and are taught by AP teachers who also work for the College Board.
- Garden of English—Timm Freitas has resources for both Lang and Lit students on his website and YouTube channel. He also has an ultimate review packet for Lang students for \$25.
- Coach Hall Writes—Coach Hall's website and YouTube channel are geared more toward Lang students.
- Marco Learning—In addition to some free resources, like their Jumpstart Courses, Marco Learning also has Boot Camps beginning in April for each AP class. Each camp is \$49.



# Students have been busy in QHS Math Classes! Below are some highlights:



- Algebra I: Students have studied functions and how to solve and graph equations and inequalities.
- Geometry/Geometry Advanced: Students have studied the relationships and properties of triangles, quadrilaterals, and parallels and constructed a town using their relationships.
- Algebra II: Students have studied quadratics, complex numbers, and radical functions and are currently exploring polynomial functions.
- Decision Making with Data: Students enjoyed a Barbie bungee jump project to end their unit on scatterplots.

Your student should be registering for courses for the 2023-2024 school year! Below is a graphic to see the next math course recommended for your student. The requirement for graduation is **three** math credits **received** in 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> grade. However, many colleges require students to have **four** math credits.

They will be writing one email a month in German to their pen pal, and then receiving an email back in English.

## LOOKING BACK...

In November, our Spanish and German Club students took an amazing field trip to Truman State University, where we participated in the Classical and Modern Languages Festival. Students had a chance to learn how to dance the salsa, use Italian hand gestures, and count in Chinese,



just to name a few of their experiences. Thanks to Truman, our students had an amazing day and the chance to see what the study of foreign language could look like beyond high school!



In December, the two clubs paired up again—this time to teach the children at Baldwin's after school childcare about Christmas traditions in the German and Spanish cultures. 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
